BUYING A HOUSE AS AN EXPAT: FEELING HOME IN EINDHOVEN



Ilji is South Korean and works at ASML as a Mechanical Engineer. She comes from a hightech region of South Korea where she studied Aerospace Engineering. She happened to meet a Dutch recruiter and now she lives and works in Eindhoven, more than 8,000 km from her homeland. Her second home, she says herself. She has been living in her new home for almost a year now. Strik Creemers & Partners helped her with financial advice. It started with a pizza slice

We meet Ilji at her new home. It's the first time we actually meet in person. Due to Covid-19, contact so far has been via video calls. She lives in a small, friendly neighbourhood in a bungalow with one bedroom, one bathroom, study and a garden with gazebo. It is very light and spacious and a lot of wood has been used in construction. It's very natural and sustainable - exactly what she was looking for.

Ilji commences: 'I went with a friend to a recruitment event at a university where she studied. At the time, I had been working as a Research Scientist in South Korea. I sat down somewhere in the back with a slice of pizza. Despite having indicated no interest beforehand, I ended up talking to a recruiter from Yacht. His story about Eindhoven's openness and opportunities as a high-tech region, its open culture and life-work balance immediately appealed to me.'

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Contract with ASML

Her interest was piqued. Her resume was submitted with her background details. An hour later, she signed. A contract at ASML followed.

Ilji: 'After graduating, I studied in England at Cranfield University where I did a post-graduate course in Astronautics. But I missed my family. So I decided to return to South Korea.' 'Eindhoven was much more like the area I come from, the way I experience it. I had not planned to come here, but when the opportunity arose to work at ASML, I went for it.'

Buying your own home in a different country

After a year, she decided to take the plunge and start looking into buying a house. At that time, there was speculation of an economic recession due to the uncertainty surrounding Covid-19. The impact of the recession was uncertain and the housing market was frozen. 'Lots of people told me to be careful, but I felt it made sense to buy a house to live in my own place.'

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In her search for a home of her own, she contacted Evert Creemers, financial advisor at Strik Creemers & Partners, for financial advice and to determine what amount she could handle in terms of mortgage.

When an advert for the De Kleine Akker project in Eindhoven caught her eye, it totally fitted the bill for her. A project with 14 houses and flats that would be developed sustainably and with reused materials.

Ilji: 'I was one of the lucky ones to be allocated a house. All I needed was a financial check, prepared by Strik Creemers & partners, to show that I had the financing in place to confirm my registration. After a minor delay due to an environmental survey the project got underway, and a year and a half after I applied I got the key to my house.' Ilji likes her home and the neighbourhood she lives in. My neighbour immediately came to help me hang the ceiling lamp.'

'If you are an expat working in Eindhoven and looking to buy a house here, it is important to explore and get a sense of the kind of house and area where you want to live. Feeling at home

Ilji is very family-oriented. She misses her parents and her brother. Even so, she is beginning to feel at home in Eindhoven 'Now I can travel again, I would like to go back to South Korea once or twice a year to visit family and friends. When I am back home now, I don't feel the same connection as when I lived there. My work and my social life are in Eindhoven now. Every time I arrive at Schiphol Airport or Eindhoven Central Station, this feels like my home away from home.'

In the future, she definitely wants to return to South Korea someday. When, is still an open question. Ilji concludes: 'I live for today, we will see what tomorrow brings.'
